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# A PRE-ELECTION DAY SURVEY IN NORTH CAROLINA



KEY FINDINGS FROM AN OCTOBER 24–27, 2020, SURVEY OF 600 REGISTERED VOTERS

#### METHODOLOGY

Meeting Street Insights is pleased to present the key findings from a survey of registered voters in North Carolina.


Interviews were completed October 24–27, 2020, among N=600 registered voters with a mix of cell phone and landline interviewing.

The margin of error for a sample size of N=600 is  $\pm 4.0\%$ .




#### NC voters tell us that issue positions matter more than candidate character.

"While some people vote based on the issues, others vote more based on a candidate's character and personal qualities. Which is more important to you in deciding who to vote for—a candidate's positions on the issues OR a candidate's character and personal qualities?"



### Economic concerns top the list of election issues, but there are quite a few others that aren't far behind in voter importance.

"Next, we're going to look at a series of different issues and, after I read each one, please tell me how important that issue is in deciding which candidate to vote for in the election."




# Those who have yet to cast their ballots have a much different key issue list than those who have already voted.


% Very Important Issue



#### **Those Voting On Election Day**




# Unaffiliateds and Democrats have similar issue priorities, while Republicans are noticeable focused on a different issue set.



# There are clear dividing lines on what issues voters trust Republicans and Democrats more. Republicans have the slightest of edges on the economy.




#### The Covid-19 debate has shifted more to the public health side since May.

"If you had to pick only one, would you say the Coronavirus here in North Carolina has created more of a health crisis or an economic crisis?"




#### As we saw in May, this issue has a significant partisan flavor to it.


#### Meanwhile, the personal economic impact hasn't changed much since May.


# Women, younger voters, and those in the Triad are more likely to say they have been economically impacted by the pandemic.

% Who Have Experienced Loss In Household Income Because Of Covid-19




#### The Governor's approval rating on Covid-19 is down, but still quite positive.

### Slightly more NC voters believe the shutdown orders were a positive thing, especially Unaffiliateds, Democrats, and African Americans.



### A majority of voters also say they would support new shutdown orders if Covid-19 cases continue to increase in North Carolina.



# Two-thirds of voters support reopening schools for in-person instruction, with Dads and Republicans showing the most support for this.


"Over the next few months, school systems across the state will begin the process of reopening for in-person instruction.

"Thinking about the coronavirus pandemic, do you think that the worst of the coronavirus is over, or do you think the worst of the coronavirus pandemic is still to come?"






# Most NC voters have a favorable view of BLM, but most do not view defunding the police and socialism favorably.



"Do you believe that Amy Coney Barrett should be confirmed to serve as a Justice on the United States Supreme Court, or not?"






### President Trump's image rating has been remarkably stable since taking office and unchanged since May. Meanwhile, Biden's image is better today.







# Unaffiliateds have become noticeably more positive about former Vice President Biden over the past six months.












# There's not been much movement on the gender races, while the Governor's race has tightened the most since May.

#### **General Assembly Ballot Trend**
















## We do have one contest that's not within the margin of error: North Carolina's favorite college sports team.

"Completely changing topics, which one of the following North Carolina colleges or universities would you say you tend to pull for more when it comes to college sports? Are you more of a fan of..."




# Biden has a double-digit lead with Demon Deacon and Tarheel fans, while Trump is going to need a lot more Mountaineer magic in the closing days.




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# All signs are pointing to record voter turnout, and this has been building for some time (even before Covid-19 and the death of George Floyd).




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# Here's where things get tricky, though: how voters cast their ballots this year will be a whole new experience for us.

"And how do you plan to vote in the November elections?"




Let's assume 10% of those who are mailing in their ballots wait until the last minute...




And, let's assume each state votes exactly as they did in 2016...

# On Election Night, we could have 10 states where the number of late-arriving votes will be greater than the margin of victory.




## But, it gets even more complicated than that. Most Trump voters say they will vote in-person, while most Biden voters are mailing it in.






# Trump looks like the winner on Election Night, but absentee ballots in FL, PA, and WI could swing the race over to Biden in the end.





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
